Reflections on 2023

Dear Press On community,

Press On came into existence six years ago to challenge the status quo that mainstream media upholds. We
believe that ethical journalism – movement journalism
– challenges oppression and advances liberation. Press
On prioritizes the voices of Southern Black, brown, trans, queer, immigrant, working-class, incarcerated, and disabled people as the expert media makers of their own lives.

In 2023, we faced an onslaught of attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives, Critical Race Theory, trans and queer communities, reproductive rights, the environment, and in the last three months, we saw how the genocide in Gaza has unfolded.

What we saw as a response were millions of people in the streets, in legislative buildings, in school board meetings, and locked to construction cranes. By their side, and in solidarity, we saw movement journalists document these social justice fights to get accurate information out to the communities who need it most.

Press On works to resource and strengthen organizers and media makers as they shift narratives, ideologies, and reshape the field of journalism.

We deeply resonate with murdered Palestinian poet Refaat Alareer's quote, "If I must die, you must live, to tell my story," as guidance in this work.

Participant Feedback

67% of participants are BIPOC Southerners.
77% of participants are queer.
Participants come from every state and territory in the South.
Participants on average rated the quality of the trainings 4.58/5.
477 participants registered for our Level Up trainings.

"I got a more thorough understanding of the roles, skills, and capabilities of documenting and sharing on people and issues. My most major takeaway is to do it!!!!! It's necessary and vital, and there are so many other folks who aren't trained journalists, and the work we do is still valuable. My other takeaway is lead with integrity and care. Just take care with people, how their story is being told, and I got some practical skills about how to do that—researching, editing, fact checking, and sticking to your principles.

Program Spotlight

Southern Movement Media Fund

The Southern Movement Media Fund provides grants to Southern movement journalism practioners, providing them support to work alongside their communities, with each other, and movement partners to produce the news and information people need to make informed decisions about their lives.

In 2023, the Southern Movement Media Fund awarded a total of \$186,000 to 30 Black, Indigenous, queer, and trans-led movement media projects across the South. We see <u>our grantees</u> as the model for movement media and believe that if projects like these were more fully funded, the entire media industry could be transformed

Movement Journalism Network

There are 300+ organizers/media makers in the movement journalism network who share resources and strategies. Patrice Wilson curates the network with a monthly newsletter and weekly prompts to engage participants and support their well-being.

The network served as a connector for nine Southern movement journalists to meet, build trust, and ultimately produce a powerful op-ed on <u>the need for journalists to speak out against the ongoing</u> <u>genocide in Gaza</u>. This op-ed was co-published in eight different movement media outlets simultaneously. Not only did this project build lasting relationships, but it also consolidated efforts, skills, and expertise to focus on the much needed political intervention at hand, while also creating a model that could be replicated.

Welcome Neesha!


New addition to our staff:

In 2023, Press On welcomed Neesha Powell-Ingabire as a full-time staff member to direct the Level Up program.

She is a coastal Georgia-born-and-raised movement journalist, essayist, and community & cultural organizer living in Atlanta/occupied Muscogee territory.

She first engaged with Press On in 2019 as one of the inaugural Freedomways reporting fellows, producing two stories about reproductive injustices in Georgia and collaborating with SPARK Reproductive Justice NOW on a live podcast about how fake clinics (so-called "crisis pregnancy centers") harm pregnant people by coercing them into not seeking abortion care. She also received a grant from Press On's Southern Movement Media Fund in 2020, allowing her to report on environmental threats to Gullah Geechee culture in her home county.

Her debut book, <u>COME BY HERE: A Memoir</u> <u>in Essays from Georgia's Geechee Coast</u>, will be published by Hub City Press on September 24, 2024.
